
Meetings take place on a Monday lunchtimes in Performing Arts! In our meetings we discuss how can make a positive impact to homeless people in our community.

<u>Year 11 History Trip</u>

On Thursday 19th September 102 GCSE History pupils went to Durham Cathedral to gain a greater understanding of the influence of the Norman Conquest in the north of England. This is a vital component of the Paper 2 Historic Environment question which focuses solely on the Cathedral at Durham. Pupils were given a guided tour and talks of key features within the Cathedral such as the magnificent, vaulted rib ceiling. Pupils also got to have a look at the cloisters and learn about the strict lives of the Benedictine monks; we even got to play dress up! After the morning tours, students went and enjoyed lunch in Durham centre, take in the sights and do some shopping. It was then back up to the Cathedral for the final tour and a visit to the shrine of St. Cuthbert before we went back to the coaches. Overall, the weather was good (a rarity for the North East), and students were impeccably behaved throughout! A wonderful and successful History outing.



Year 11 Geography Field Trip

On Wednesday 25th September, the Year 11 Geography classes went on day two of their GCSE field trips. This time they were investigating the changes in the River Wyre as it flow downstream. Pupils spent the morning measuring characteristics of the river like velocity, width, depth and bedload. In the afternoon, they visited Garstang and St. Michael's, to see the flood prevention methods which have been put in place to reduce damage. Pupils were all brilliant and we even managed to stay dry, despite the wet week we had been having.





Duke of Edinburgh Expedition Weekend

Last weekend saw 47 Year 11 pupils complete the expedition side of their Duke of Edinburgh Award. At 10 o'clock on the Friday morning pupils arrived at Waddecar Campsite with their sleeping bags, walking boots and an extensive supply of food and snacks. They got to work straight away pitching their tents and packing their rucksacks before they planned the first of 3 walking routes that they would complete over the next few days.

We were blessed with beautiful weather and after a successful first day pupils put their camp-craft skills to the test by preparing their first hot meal of the expedition. As the sun set on the Friday evening, pupils queued outside the staff quarters for hot chocolate before retreating from the chilly wind into their tents.

Again on the Saturday the sun shone whilst pupils completed their first assessed solo navigation. Pupils walked approximately 10 miles (some groups even more!) along a route they had planned together in their small groups the previous evening. This task combines navigation skills, physical endurance and mental perseverance; all of which our pupils excelled in throughout. The Sam Sykes team told us that it was unusual to get a full cohort to the top of Parlick carrying full equipment, an amazing achievement! We gathered together on Saturday evening to toast the success of Day 2 with marshmallows around the campfire, before pupils retreated to their tents for a well-deserved rest.







On Sunday morning, everyone rose early to put their tents down, tidy camp and complete their final walk. Pupils then had to do a group presentation to their assessor about their chosen aim for the weekend. The external assessors from Sam Sykes commented on numerous occasions that these were some of the best groups of young adults that they had ever had the pleasure of working with. We are incredibly proud of the resilience, enthusiasm and support for each other that we witnessed throughout the entire weekend.

Thank you to Mr Case, Mr Duffy, Miss Johnston and Miss Tasker for trading their duvets for sleeping bags and supporting the weekend.


Year 8 Boys Football
