### National final of the food. Farming and Natural Environment Competition 2024

Over the weekend of 18th-20th October we were lucky enough to be one of 6 schools in the National final which took place at Myerscough College. We joined schools from all over the country, some as far afield as Kent, for the action packed days of the final. 3 pupils from Year 10, John D, Amy B and Peter B have worked hard on their entries right from the beginning and it was only right that they should represent the school in this prestigious event. We were treated to a tour of the campus on Friday afternoon, meeting Scottish Wildcats, touring the facilities for Motorsports, Animal Care and Equine studies. We had a fantastic evening on ice breaker style activities, identifying birds from their songs, identifying unusual pieces of farm apparatus, even completing a taste test to identify different styles of honey. We were very pleased to find out that we won this section by earning the hightest point tally! After tea the pupils also received the statement of the weekend that they would need to create a presentation about. "Building climate resilience into food production is essential for securing the future of agriculture." Later on in the evening gave pupils the opportunity to experience what it is like to stay in student accommodation which really helped them to see what was on offer at the college, even from the age of 16.

Saturday started with a trip, less than a mile down the road, to the Myerscough Farm where we were again given a tour, being able to see the process of caring for and rearing calves, right through to dairy cows, exploring the role of silage on the farm, how the cows were fed the correct nutritional diets, how solar power was used and how the robotic milking machines worked. We then went on to a soil activity where we were able to examine the soil compaction around us, looking at layers in the soil and testing how quickly water could travel through. We conducted a search of when water is used on the farm, had a talk about Cow Genetics in Modern Farming, conducted a waste walk and considered ways in which waste could be reduced. We were really lucky to also learn how to lay a hedge - cutting and bending a plant such as Hawthorne and 'laying' it down against others to create a structured hedge shape, creating space for wildlife. All students and Mr Case were exceptional at using an axe to complete this task! Throughout the weekend we were able to experience wonderful guest speakers talks from McDonalds, explaining their sustainable plans, The Lakes Free Range Egg company, showing how eggs are graded and what makes a happy hen, a talk from Genus explaining how farmers ensure female calves and the genetic characteristics of cows. These were such an interesting and insightful explorations into the varied and essential career that is farming.

On Sunday the students had the chance to develop their presentations further and then had to present to a panel of judges, which is always a nerve wracking experience. They delivered an exciting and interesting speech linked to their theme and it was clear to see the passion they had for the topics. Sadly, they did not win the overall competition but to make it to the final 6 in the country is such an incredible feat and we are so proud of their hard work and effort. Well done everyone!







#### Year 10 Newspaper Dress Project

Year 10 Textiles students have been working on a creative project that blends art, design, and sustainability. As part of their curriculum, students explored the evolution of fashion by investigating both historical and contemporary designers. The project aims to teach students about the fundamentals of fashion design, including pleats, folds, and silhouettes. Provided with only pins, scissors, and a healthy dose of imagination, each student transformed simple sheets of newspaper into intricate garments, showcasing their understanding of structure and form.

Our goal was to challenge students to think critically about fashion and its environmental impact. Using newspaper not only sparked their creativity but also highlighted the importance of sustainability in design. Students drew inspiration from renowned designers, creating pieces that reflected their unique interpretations of style. From classic silhouettes to avant–garde designs, the dresses varied in aesthetic, demonstrating the diverse influences in the fashion world. The project not only fostered creativity and teamwork among students but also reinforced the importance of eco-friendly practices in the world of fashion. As the students showcased their talents, they reminded us all of the potential for beauty and innovation, even in the most unexpected materials.

#### **Exciting Times for English at All Hallows!**


The English Department is proud to announce the formation of two exciting teams: the Poetry by Heart team and the Rotary Club Youth Speaks team!

#### Scarlett Walker Year 7 Red Rose Classic Gymnastics Challenge

Scarlett's performance at the 2024 Red Rose Classic Challenge was outstanding. Competing for Longridge Gymnastics Club, she secured first place in her age category (Age 11), earning both a gold medal and a championship trophy. Competing at the Copper level, she faced gymnasts from various clubs across Lancashire, including Southport, Thornton, and Garstang.

Scarlett showcased her skills on four apparatus: vault, beam, bars, and floor. Notably, she achieved gold on the beam, where her routine featured a challenging element known as a 'backwards flic,' demonstrating her ability to perform a complete backwards rotation on a balance beam that is only 10cm wide and 4ft off the ground. Additionally, she earned silver medals on both bars and floor, competing at the highest level of difficulty. Her accomplishments reflect her dedication and talent in gymnastics.
