The Children of Fatima

In 1917, three children- Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta- reported seeing the Virgin Mary in Fatima, Portugal. Despite their young age, they relayed her messages of prayer and repentance. Many doubted or dismissed them, thinking children could not be trusted with divine visions.

This scepticism reflects the message of our Word of the Week from St Paul's letter to Timothy. The children were called to deliver an important message despite their age, showing that God can work through anyone, regardless of how others perceive them. But also that God does entrust important tasks to young people. These three children were visited by Mary for a reason, she knew these young people were the perfect people to deliver this message to others.


This I Believe (The Creed)







This Sunday is the Feast of Christ the King. This feast day celebrates
