Word of the Week

1 John 3: 16-18

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.

This week's Word of the Week teaches us the importance of showing love through action, not just words. It tells us that true love is about caring for others, especially those in need, and making a real difference in their lives. Catholic Social Teaching teaches us the principle of participation, which emphasizes that everyone has a right to be involved in decisions that affect their lives. 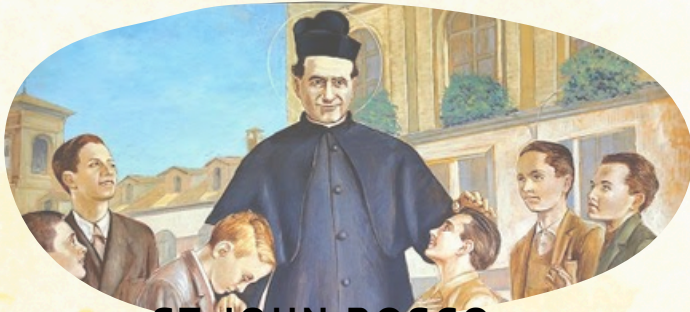

ST JOHN BOSCO

St John Bosco, born in 1815 in Italy, dedicated his life to helping disadvantaged youth. Despite facing poverty and obstacles, he pursued his dream of becoming a priest. Bosco founded the Salesian Order, focusing on education, kindness and compassion for troubled youth. He established schools, orphanages, and vocational training centres, providing opportunities for a better future. Bosco's innovative teaching methods and emphasis on love and understanding earned him admiration. Canonized in 1934, he is celebrated for his commitment to serving others and his impact on education and youth welfare.



PARTICIPATION

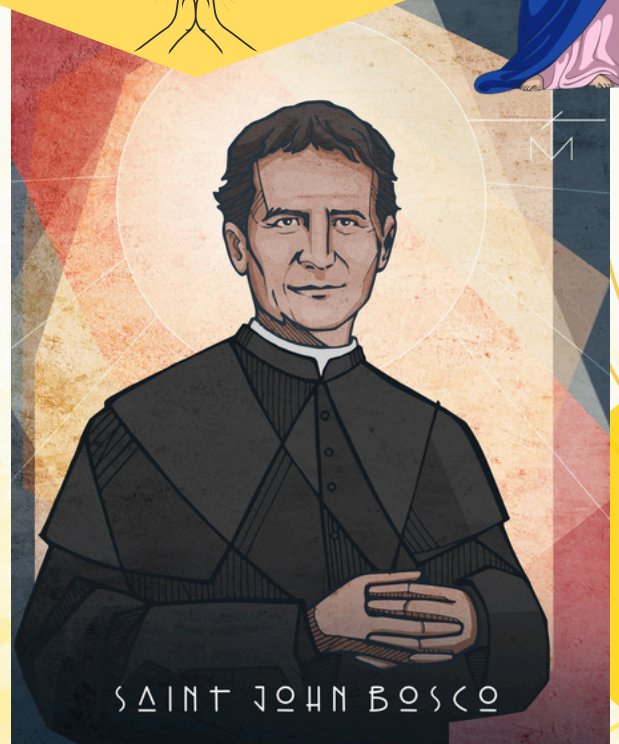
The Catholic Social Teaching principle of participation emphasises that all people have the right and duty to be involved in the decisions that affect their lives and the community. It encouraged everyone to take an active role in society, ensuring that their voices are heard.

St John Bosco understood the importance of participation, especially for young people. He empowered young people believing that they had something valuable to contribute to society. He didn't just want to help them; he wanted to empower them to be active participants in their own education and growth.

St John Bosco encouraged young people to participate in the life of the Church and society, so that they could make a real difference in the world around them.
