



The VEX IQ National Championships at the International Centre in Telford was a fantastic experience for All Hallows Catholic High School, with two teams entering and both performing exceptionally well against the top 60 robotics schools in the UK. Our students showed their skills and dedication in a brilliant two-day competition.

Our Year 9 team, consisting of Oliver B, Matthew C, Tom D, Henry B, and Edward W, achieved an incredible 3rd place overall. Their journey through the competition was filled with outstanding performances, and they were agonisingly close to qualifying for the World Championships, missing out only in the very last game. Their success did not go unrecognised, as they proudly took home two trophies: Division Runners-Up and the Judges' Award.

Our Year 10 team, made up of Kiitan A, Mia W, Amy B, Ciaran L, Joseph F, and John D, also excelled, battling through to the final knockout phases and securing an impressive 11th place. This is a phenomenal achievement, reflecting the immense effort and technical expertise they poured into their robot.

To have the 3rd and 1lth best secondary school robotics teams in the entire UK is an significant accomplishment for any secondary school. Our students demonstrated not only their skill in competitive robotics but also their outstanding understanding of robot design, coding, and mechanics, including gears, pulleys, belts, chains, pneumatics, linkages, motors, sensors, drivetrains, and much more. Their ability to construct such highly competitive robots is a testament to their hard work, dedication, and problem-solving abilities.

This result was the best of any school in the North of the UK and places All Hallows as the one of the leading secondary schools in the UK for robotics. However, we would like to continue expanding our programme and offering more students both at All Hallows and within our local communities the chance to compete in this incredible competition. 
For anyone interested in seeing the action from the VEX IQ National Championships, the event can be watched on YouTube.

Attendance

In January 2025, All Hallows transitioned to a new platform called 'Attend' to improve our monitoring of school attendance. This change comes in response to national concerns about attendance, which is closely linked to students' academic success, social skills, and overall well-being.

We have seen firsthand how poor attendance impacts not just individual students but the entire classroom. When a child is absent, it disrupts their learning and can create challenges for teachers trying to keep the class on track. Additionally, frequent absences may lead to anxiety for students, who can feel overwhelmed by missed content.

The 'Attend' system, integrated with our existing Synergy System, will help us communicate more effectively with you about your child's attendance. You will receive regular updates regarding any attendance concerns or achievements, keeping you informed and engaged in your child's school journey.

We encourage your support in fostering resilience and commitment in your child. Consistent attendance is crucial for their academic and personal growth. By working together, we can ensure that our students succeed and enjoy their educational experience.

EXCESSIVE LEAVE IN TERM TIME - S444 EDUCATION ACT 1996

Lancashire County Council are currently reviewing the arrangements for pupils who are absent from school due to unauthorised leave/holidays.

Attendance at school is vital to help children thrive and achieve their best. Children who are absent from school can fail to meet their academic potential and those who fall below 90% attendance are at significant risk of underachieving.

Absence during term time must be avoided. If you are considering taking your child out of school for any reason, it is essential that you request permission for the absence.

When penalty notices are issued, parents have the opportunity to discharge liability for an offence under S444 of the Education Act instead of being prosecuted by the Local Authority. The penalty notice regulations determine the amount of the penalty notice fine. Unfortunately, some parents are choosing to remove their children from school for longer periods, as the fine amount is the same regardless of the number of school days missed.

From 01/01/2025, the following rules will apply:

- 1. Unauthorised leave less than 15 school days: penalty notice issued
- 2. **Unauthorised leave of 15 school days or more:** the Local Authority will review any requests for penalty notices and may **prosecute** parents and not offer the opportunity to pay a penalty notice fine instead.

Where enough notice is given for a warning to be issued, and a request made is for 3 weeks (15 school days) or more out of school, the Local Authority may issue you with a warning explaining that you will not have the opportunity to pay a fine and that you will be prosecuted if the leave is still taken. Even if the authority doesn't send you a warning letter, you can still be prosecuted for the offence as there is no legal entitlement to a warning or a penalty notice.

Failure to ensure your child's regular attendance at school is a criminal offence, and this means that if you are convicted, this could result in a fine of up to £2,500 and you will have a criminal record.

We have been asked by Lancashire County Council to issue this warning to parents to inform you that this procedure will now be applied to all excessive leave requests made to this school.

Bus Money

We would like to kindly remind parents to ensure that students using the bus service to get home have the necessary fare with them. Unfortunately, we can no longer offer loans for bus fares, as we are due a substantial amount.

We appreciate your understanding and co-operation in this matter, as it helps us maintain a smooth and efficient service for all students.





GIVING DURING LENT

Almsgiving is a Lenten practice that involves acts of charity and love for others. It's a way to show solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and to acknowledge that we are all part of the human community.

Why is almsgiving important?

- It strengthens our love for others
- It increases our detachment
- It contributes to greater social justice
- It helps us understand that we are not possessed by our possessions
- It helps us say, "Here is what I can offer, and I offer it out of love for you"
